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Head, Heart and Hands

Remember the children's poem, "Going on a Bear Hunt"? We learned it in camp or Vacation Bible School—an "echo" song with silly actions, where we followed the leader through tall grass and thick mud to find a bear . . . and then we ran back home to hide under the covers. Bear hunts were fun!

Remember Hide and Seek? When my kids were young, they'd "hide" by just closing their eyes. If they couldn't see me, then I couldn't see them, they reasoned. There they'd stand, clearly visible, "hiding" in the middle of the hallway, with their eyes shut tight. They weren't very hard to find. There's something exciting about going on a hunt—about looking for a treasure. The thrill is in the hunt, and the reward is in the discovery. The apostle Paul knew this to be true—not just for children, but for followers of Christ.

The Christian life entails a childlike faith, an exhilarating pursuit, a lasting treasure. Speaking about the Christians in Laodicea, Paul wrote to the church in Colos sae, "My goal is that they may be encouraged in heart and united in love, so that they may have the full riches of complete understanding, in order that they may know the mystery of God, namely, Christ, in whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" (Colossians 2:2, 3). Paul's greatest wish—for himself (Philippians 3:10) and for others—was to know Christ. Paul said that, more than anything, knowing Christ is a treasure hunt worth pursuing.

How to Hunt

The thrill is in the hunt . . . and the reward is in the discovery. Seeking such a treasure—knowing Christ himself—will take every part of us: our heads, our hearts, and our hands.

Search Out: A Mind to Know Christ

My son Nathan has always been on a quest to know more. An academic by nature, Nathan has read more in his two decades of life than I have in my more-than-four. A junior at Ozark Christian College, Nathan reads theologians, desert fathers, philoso-

phers, Bible commentators, and, most of all by far, the Bible. Having a mind to know Christ requires dedicated, disciplined Bible study and Scripture memorization. OCC has always taught "the Word of Christ in the Spirit of Christ," and as Nathan searches out truth in the Bible, he searches out Christ himself. Day by day, Nathan learns more about the Christ he loves, and the thrill is in the hunt. As he "asks, seeks, and knocks," he discovers that Jesus wants to give "so much more" than he can imagine (Luke 11:9-13).

Of course, those of us who aren't Bible college scholars can still search out Christ through his Word. Through diligent Bible study, we can know "all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" that are ours in Christ. Maybe it's a daily Bible reading plan, or a long-term Scripture memory project, or journaling through a book of the Bible, prayerfully asking the Lord to reveal truth as we go. In whatever method we seek to learn "the Word of Christ in the Spirit of Christ," the thrill is in the hunt!

Uncover: A Heart to Love Christ

On our treasure hunt, we'll uncover riches—unfathomable, untold treasures that are ours in Christ. What abundant life, what deep love, what insurmountable power, what inexpressible joy he has for us. The more we search out, the more we'll uncover these eternal treasures.

My middle daughter, Anne, has always been a kind-hearted, compassionate "feeler." Anne's strength is her heart, and she loves deeply. Anne doesn't just "have friends." She nurtures lasting relationships. In May, Anne graduated from high school, and for the past few months, I've been in a mom-panic, trying to cram important last lessons into her final few days at home. Can she do laundry? Yes. Make her bed? Check. Follow a budget? Well, she knows how, at least. But while all those tasks certainly have a place, there's only one thing she needs for true life: the person of Jesus Christ.

More than anything, I want Anne's strong heart to love Jesus. To cling to him, to love him, to know him as the most faithful friend, the sweetest Savior, the

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The Elders Perspective

Our Source of Power...

The Christian life isn't a standard of performance or a code of ethics, but vital personal relationship with a loving God. Just as our relationship with God is totally dependent on what God has done through Jesus Christ, so the power to live a dynamic Christian life also comes totally from God. Through our new identity in Christ, we have all we need to live as a new creation in Christ. But to do so, we must continually draw from the proper Source of power.

The Holy Spirit is the power source of the Christian life. The Holy Spirit is God which came to dwell in us, convict the world of sin and justice.

The Holy Spirit came to lead us into the truth, glorify Christ, confirms our relationship with God, and is the source of Christ like qualities in our life.

Not all Christians experience the Holy Spirit's power. Although the Holy Spirit lives within all Christians, not all Christians are filled or directed and empowered by the Holy Spirit. The Bible tells us there are three kinds of people; the natural, spiritual and carnal:

The natural person – those who have not trusted Christ's death to pay for their sins and therefore, Christ does not live in them (1 Corinthians 2:14). The natural person directs his or her own life and sits in control.

The spiritual person – those who have trusted Christ as their Savior and are resting in the Power of the Holy Spirit to live the Christian life. (1 Corinthians 2:15). The spiritual person has invited Christ into his or her life and has allowed him to take control through the Holy Spirit. This person therefore yields to Christ's direction.

The carnal person – those who have trusted Christ to pay for their sins, but who are trusting their own efforts to live the Christian life (carnal refers to "flesh or human strength" as opposed to "the Spirit"). A carnal Christian lives in the energy of the flesh, not in the power of the Spirit (1 Corinthians

3:1-2). Although Christ lives in the carnal person's life, the Holy Spirit is not allowed to direct it. Instead the person remains in control.

We can be continually empowered by the Holy Spirit. The abundant Christian life is the Christ-directed life by which Christ lives his life in and through us in the power of the Holy Spirit. We can be filled with the Holy Spirit only by faith, by trusting God to produce in us the fruitful life he promised.

If you find that you have retaken control of your life through sin – any definite act of disobedience – simply breathe spiritually (exhale the impure and inhale the pure). This important exercise will enable you to continue to experience Christ's loving control in your life throughout each day.

Spiritual breathing is a lifelong process. How do we follow the command to "be filled with the Spirit" (Eph. 5:18) and how does it affect our daily life? We can picture our life as being a car; when we invite Jesus Christ into our life, he comes in and takes the driver's seat. He is the best driver and he knows the way.

But time and time again we think we know better, so we take back the wheel, we need to confess it and move over and let him have it back. "Because those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God."

Exhale – confess all known sin. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." Remember the three factors involved in confession: 1) Agree with God that you have sinned; 2) Thank God that he has already forgiven you; 3) Trust God to change your wrong attitudes and actions.

Inhale – claim by faith the fullness of the Spirit through: 1) surrendering the control of your life to Christ and 2) trusting that he now directs and empowers you as you obey.

The Holy Spirit is our source of power. As we trust Jesus Christ, God's spirit will produce his character within us and empower us to be his witness.

The previous Journey of Joy article ended with: "Celebrate life with a bounce in your step, keep that smile on your face and rejoice in your hearts for you are children of God!" What does it mean to be a child of God? Or, more specifically, what is my (our) new identity in Christ? As I pondered and researched these questions, this is what God brought to mind; we are chosen, we are treasured and we are forgiven. Let's take a closer look at these and discover what God says about who we are.

First, we are chosen. First Peter 2:9 says, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession..." When these words were originally written in Exodus and repeated in Deuteronomy, they were spoken for the nation of Israel, but by God's design and through the sacrifice of Christ, we have been grafted into this "holy nation" we are chosen! In fact, not only are we chosen but in Ephesians 1 we find that we have always been chosen: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ, just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we would be holy and blameless before Him".

The God of creation has always had a plan for YOUR salvation, He chose YOU. Jesus, when speaking to His disciples in John 15:16 says: "You did not choose Me but I chose you," and in verse 19: "...but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world..." Yes, we are included in that term "disciples" and, yes, He chose you out of the world.

As the chosen of God, we are treasured by Him! I can say this with confident joy in my heart because it comes directly from God's word in Deuteronomy 26:18: "The Lord has today declared you to be His people, a treasured possession, as He promised you, and that you should keep all His commandments". We are loved beyond compare, without end and regardless of the life

we have led. He treasures us whether we are in the depths of despair, weighted down with sin or walking successfully along the path He has laid out for us. Evidence that we are treasured by Him is found throughout the Bible where God repeatedly speaks of His great love for us. One example is 1 John 3:1: "See how great a love the Father has bestowed on us, that we would be called children of God; and such we are."

No matter where you are in your Spiritual life, have confidence that you are loved and treasured by Him. Never allow the burdens of this broken world to drag you away from this truth. Romans 8:38-39 tells us: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing, will be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." God's love cannot be stolen or shifted away from us; it can't be tainted by what we do, it is the solid ground that we can stand on through anything that comes our way. That foundation of love sets us apart, it shines through us to the world around us. It draws the lost to us and gives us the opportunity to share that love with them.

As disciples of Jesus Christ, I think the hardest thing for us to accept in this new life is that we are forgiven. We believe our sins are too great and we hold onto the shame because we think it is what we deserve or we think that shame is the natural consequence for our actions. This is not the life that God wants for us, Galatians 5:13 says: "For you were called to freedom..." and again in verse 1 of the same chapter: "It was for freedom that Christ set us free; therefore keep standing firm and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery" (meaning sin's slavery). As believers, we are set free of the bonds of sin that the worldly suffer under.

Do not mistake this though as a license to continue to do whatever you desire. Our CHOICE is to believe and to give ourselves to the desires that our Father has

J127 Ministry is a Christian-based organization to aid young people who have aged out of the foster care system, are orphaned or homeless due to lack of family. We are in the process of building a home in Durant, OK where we will provide a loving environment, focus on the individuals' needs helping reinforce them in critical life skills, emotional support, spiritual growth, and education needs. By providing the right tools they will have a great chance of becoming successful as they transition into adulthood and become productive adults who will be able to break the cycle of poverty in every area of their lives. We will be able to help build their support system as they learn new coping techniques, problem-solving skills, reach their educational goals, heal emotionally and grow spiritually. We accomplish this by using 5 basic principles:

Spiritually - Develop intentional relationships with God and finding their purpose in life.

Support - Students will be matched up with three loving, caring, supportive, lifelong mentors that will walk side by side with their mentee to help them accomplish their educational goals and learn necessary life

skills. They will find genuine acceptance and encouragement for now and in the future.

Life Skills - Weekly, mandatory practical life skill classes. Ranging from budgeting, cooking, sewing, gardening, taxes, health care/first aid, resume building, job skills, Bible study, healthy relationships, parenting, car maintenance and more.

Education - Help students with their educational needs necessary to become productive members of their community and break the cycle of poverty. Youth will be required to enroll in trade school, college, GED training, or job training in a particular area by the end of the third month living at the transitional home, as well as a full or part-time job, depending on educational goals.

Service - Students will be involved in the community through volunteering with local non-profits, city projects, and churches. By giving back and serving others, we strongly believe you can discover who you were uniquely created to be.

The Prayer Corner

Jesus prayed for several reasons but one of the biggest was given as an example of what our prayer life should be. What example does He set?

1. He prayed for others. We know this because children were brought to Him so He could place His hands on them and pray for them. We too need to pray for others.

2. Jesus prayed with others. Luke 9:28 reads, "[Jesus] took Peter, John and James with Him and went up onto a mountain to pray." As our perfect example Jesus knew the value of praying with others.

3. Jesus prayed alone. Luke 5:16 says, "Jesus withdrew to lonely places and prayed." As much as Jesus understood the value of praying with and for others, He also understood the need to pray alone.

4. Jesus prayed in nature. What better place to commune with our Creator than among the wonders of nature? Luke 6:12 says, "One of those days Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray ..." He could have gone to a home, a synagogue or the Temple. But there were times when Jesus made the decision to pray where He was, which often happened to be in nature.

5. Jesus prayed regularly. This insight is gleaned from Luke 5:16: "Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." The word "often" is not hidden, but makes it obvious that Jesus prayed regularly.

6. The prayers of Jesus were heartfelt. Jesus did not pray in a cold, distant manner but in heartfelt supplication, demonstrating empathy and a genuine love for God. This is seen clearly in John 17, where Jesus prays for Himself, His immediate disciples, and for all believers.

7. Jesus prayed based on His knowledge of God and His truths. The prayers of Jesus were based on God's revealed truths and, as such, were in line with a solid biblical worldview. In John 4:24 Jesus said, "God is spirit, and His worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth." Proper prayer requires us to have a truthful understanding of God and what He has revealed to us through His Word.

8. Jesus taught persistence in prayer. "Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up" (Luke 18:1). We are not to pester God but be persistent, waiting on God's timing.

9. Jesus knew that not all his prayers would be answered as expected. This is a difficult prayer lesson, but the fact is that not all our prayers are answered in ways we expect. God always knows best. Jesus knew this hard lesson as He cried out to God (Matt. 26:36-44). Three times Jesus prayed for God to allow an easier path, but Jesus knew, "Yet not as I will, but as You will".

So as we pray, remember the example of Jesus. Pray for and with others, pray alone, pray in nature, pray regularly, pray with your heart, pray in truth, be persistent in prayer and pray for God's will.



Remember your commitment to pray for the church for at least two minutes each day for the following:

Pray for the relationship of the Body to God: that we would seek God first and grow in our love, our relationship and commitment to Him

Pray for our relationship to one another: that we would love one another always.

Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your request be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." ~ Philippians 4:6-7

ROUGHEN IT A GUYS GUIDE

You may have heard the saying “The only constant in life is change”, but by leaning on Christ we can weather and prosper through it!

Changes are constantly happening around us. Many times, they are small like the weather or sometimes significant like what we are experiencing currently at Berean. We’ve been blessed for the last eleven years with Troy Humphrey, an excellent pastor, and his wonderful family. It’s impossible to say what the future holds for Berean, but one thing I know is that it will never be the same. In my home, we’ve also had a big change, welcoming a new family member nearly five months ago, and regardless of how you prepare and anticipate the birth of a child it still rocks the boat. I’m sure you have gone through many changes as well; marriages, births, departures, loss, sickness and milestones.

The good news is we can take heart in knowing that while the world changes around us we have a steadfast rock to keep us grounded. I’m reminded of the song, “In Christ Alone” written by Keith Getty and Stewart Townsend. The first verse starts, “In Christ alone my hope is found, He is my light, my strength, my song. This Cornerstone, this solid ground, firm through the fiercest drought and storm.”

This verse summarizes my thoughts perfectly. As believers, we can always rely on Christ to be the rock that we build our house on. Christ is a constant in our lives even though things may be turbulent around us. We are told this in Hebrews 13:8 “Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.” He is unwavering in our lives. He is the one we need to lean on when change rocks the boat.

However, we shouldn’t seek to simply hunker down and take cover. Times of change always offer great opportunities that we should not run from. Instead we should push forward knowing that change cannot sway the stability of Christ. What then can we do when change is around the corner?

First, we can dive into the Word of God. Our understanding of God’s Word helps guide us in both the difficult changes we endure and the amazing changes we delight in. Through marriages, births, graduations, loss and suffering the Word of God provides a fountain of wisdom and support. And we, as Bereans, should especially rejoice in reading and understanding the Word:

“The brethren immediately sent Paul and Silas away by night to Berea, and when they arrived, they went into the synagogue of the Jews. Now these were more noble-minded than those in Thessalonica, for they received the word with great eagerness, examining the Scriptures daily to see whether these things were so.” (Acts 17:10-11)

Second, we can reach out to God through prayer. In Philippians 4:6-7 Paul says, “Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.” Through prayer we can speak with the Father about our worries and troubles. We can lift praises to Him for the amazing things that have changed in our lives, and if we are still, we can feel His response.

Third, we can connect with each other for celebration and support. 1 Thessalonians 5:11, “Therefore encourage one another and build up one another, just as you also are doing.” And, Hebrews 10:24-25 says, “and let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds, not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another; and all the more as you see the day drawing near.”

Throughout the Bible we find words describing the importance of meeting together. The more often the better I would say. Change is all around us and constantly affecting us, but if we rely on Christ, the Word, prayer and each other we can endure and celebrate through the changes this life brings us.

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most loving Lord. When we have hearts to love Christ, we will uncover the “full riches” found only in him. We’ll come to know Jesus, not because it’s the dutiful obligation of a Christian, but because we’re in a loving relationship with him. We’ll find that “whoever comes to [Jesus] will never go hungry, and whoever believes in [him] will never be thirsty” (John 6:35). We’ll know that the truest, most lasting treasures— life, peace, joy, identity, satisfaction, purpose, and more—are found in Christ alone.

Apply: Hands to Serve Like Christ

A third step in our treasure hunt to know Christ is application—not just hearing about Christ, or even experiencing his love, but putting his truth into practice. We never look more like Christ than when we serve, it’s the whole reason Jesus came (Mark 10:45) and we’ll never come to know him better than when we follow his example in service.

My daughter, Molly, has hands to serve. As a young child, she carried out her household chores with diligence. In middle school, Molly spearheaded a book drive for our local Ronald McDonald House. Now as a high school student, she leads worship each week in her school’s Christian club and at church, and she mentors a group of 5th grade girls. Molly doesn’t just hear the words of Jesus. She puts them into practice, and the result is the treasure of knowing the wisdom of Christ (Matthew 7:24).

Service—action—may be the most frequently forgotten aspect of the hunt. It’s easy enough to search out Christ with our minds, and to uncover his riches with our hearts, but applying his words with our hands is hard work. Serving like Christ requires perseverance, humility, and sacrifice. Even though service requires a lot, the reward of knowing Jesus through it makes our labor light.

But Why a Hunt? Treasure hunts are exciting, but sometimes . . . we’d rather not go on a hunt at all. Truthfully, at times, I’d prefer that the treasure just stand in plain sight, in the middle of the hallway, rather than having to look for it. When it comes to knowing Christ—to discovering the mystery of God in Jesus—why does it have to be a hunt at all? Wouldn’t it be easier if God would just reveal himself to us, rather than make us search for him?

Answer: because faith comes in the pursuit. Faith is found in the hunt, and trust is built in the search. If all the answers were handed to us—if all the mysteries revealed—then faith wouldn’t be necessary . . . and faith is what pleases God (Hebrews 11:6).

Jesus said, “The one who believes has eternal life” (John 6:47). In other words, the thrill is in the hunt—what faith! And the reward, the abundant, eternal life that comes from knowing Christ, is in the discovery.




